APPRENTICESHIPNI AND TRAINING FOR SUCCESS

ApprenticeshipNI is a work-based programme which offers:

- recognised training and qualifications to new and existing employees aged 16 and over;
- · across a wide range of occupational areas;
- includes the early years and playwork sectors;
- Level 2 and Level 3 both offered.

An apprenticeship can provide the training and qualifications needed to progress your career. Funding for Apprenticeships training costs are provided by the Department for the Economy (DfE). Higher Level Apprenticeships are also being developed for the Sector providing funded access to a Level 5 Qualification

The Training for Success programme is all about:

- · giving participants the tools and the confidence to find work or get into higher education
- designed for school leavers aged for 16 and 17
- extended eligibility for persons under 22 years with a disability, or under 24 years for persons from a care background

provides participants with the opportunity to gain a nationally recognised qualification, as well as practical.

CASE STUDIES

Mia (18 from Bangor) – now working as a Classroom Assistant in Special Educational Needs school

My name is Mia. I kind of liked school and did ok there. Got my Maths and English – that was the main thing!! My kid sister didn't fancy it as much. She was always getting into trouble and being cheeky to the teachers. I think it was because she couldn't do the work. Anyway, turned out she had dyslexia! Alison came into her class on Monday, Wednesday and Friday to help her .. WOW. What a difference! She did ok in her English in the end – not as good as me like....!

Anyway, when my careers teacher asked me what I wanted to do – I thought of Alison and said – I'd like to do that. I went to college at night and did my Specialist Support in Teaching and Learning Course (Classroom Assistants course to you and me) and now I work term time in a Primary School around the corner from me. It's spot on. When I have kids – and they go to school – I hope if they have problems – they have an Alison as wellor hold on a minute......a 'me' as well!!!!!!

Mary (46 from Strabane) - working as a Childminder

My name is Mary. My friends call me Mary Poppins! That's because I mind children!! If you'd told me when I was 16 that that's what I'd be doing when I was 30 - I wouldn't have believed them - but there you go! I was actually working in retail when I finished school. I did my 'A' Levels and got a job in retail. Was doing alright there as a trainee manager - I actually enjoyed going to work! Then when I had my kids - I decided to come out of work to raise them - at least for the first few vears! After Sara, our second child, my friend said to me about becoming a registered childminder. She had two kids as well - around the same age - and she really wanted to get back to work. I talked to a woman down my street who was a childminder and she put me in touch with the Northern Ireland Childminding Association. They explained to me how to go about getting registered and the benefits of staying at home with my own kids and earning some money as well they were really helpful. Even though there were times when I thought 'maybe not!!' they were a great help and got me all the training that I needed to be a childminder!! Me - back to school!!!

Anyway – that was 6 years ago. I now have 6 kids most of the time – and I love it. No two days are the same! I'm self-employed – so I get to be my own boss and be around for my kids. I get on really well with the parents too, and – well I think it keeps me young!!

Jordan (22 Belfast) - working in school age sector

Jordan here - let me tell you a bit about myself!

I left school when I was 16. Did all right in my GCSE's but wasn't sure what I wanted to do I just knew I didn't want to stay on at school. I was in the Scouts and became a helper on club nights and when we went camping. Called in to an open day at my local training organisation and someone said about this thing called Playwork! Sounded a bit like what I did in the Scouts! Signed up and I haven't looked back. I did my Level 2 and was in a placement in an afterschool's. Kids were a bit mad sometimes, but I really enjoyed it. Although it's good fun playing and helping them play. I see now how important it is — it's like serious!! I'm now a room supervisor but we all work really well together ... we are like a big team!!

Peter (42 from Newry) - working in a Day Nursery

Hi, I'm Peter, from an early age I was called Peter Pan, as I had a natural rapport with children. However, it wasn't until I was 15 and having recently been diagnosed with epilepsy that I realised what I wanted to do. My neurologist asked me what line of work I wanted to do? I replied, "to work with children", his response was that due to my epilepsy that I never would! So, to prove him wrong that summer I volunteered in a Special Needs Summer Scheme and in the first half an hour of working with the children, I knew I was hooked. This was what I wanted to do every day! So, I left school after my GCSEs (I did enough to get back for A-Levels but wanted to begin learning more about childcare). I completed my NVQ Level 2 in Childcare, then my NVQ Level 3, gaining experience working with children aged 8 weeks to 18 throughout. My aunt was a Playgroup Leader and I did a lot of my placement there and went on to be the Leader of this group, and I still hope to be as knowledgeable and amazing as my aunt. For the last 26 years I have worked with children, it is an amazing sector to be involved in. I have loved each day, even the challenging days because when you see a child progressing you know the positive impact you have had on the child and that this will help them in the future. I have gone onto SRC and completed my QCF Level 5 Leadership and Management Course and a BTEC Level 7 Unit in Strategic Leadership and Management. Currently, I am a Daycare Manager supporting my staff in delivering high quality early years care and education to our children and families. It is a privileged position to be in and one which is hard work, fun, spontaneous and rewarding.



As we approach the busy August results period I thought it might be useful to remind you of some of the options that are available to students at Northern Regional College.
